(KC) Query the 2017 tree clearing area, (RB) explained the time frames for the tree clearing from the 15th Feb – 30th April, MOP time frame runs for the calendar year

(HR) Overview of revisions to WMP

(HR) Noise monitoring overview and explanation of procedures. Map displayed of noise monitoring locations. Noise monitoring reports are available on the Idemitsu Website

- (LL) Asked if the noise monitoring location map just shown is on the Website and requested a copy of the map
- * Action (HR) to make a copy of the noise monitoring location map available on the Idemitsu Website
- (HR) Explained the Boggabri, Tarrawonga, Maules Creek (BTM Complex) meetings which are held monthly
- (HR) There were no noise exceedences reported since the last meeting
- (RB) Provided an update on the opening of the new primary access road to BC which will be off the Kamilaroi Hwy and along the old BC haul road. This will still be a private road for BC site access only. BC is currently negotiating with Narrabri Shire Council regarding the options for Leard Forest Road, the preference is for it to remain open for access to site for Manilla residents

(HR) Map of air quality monitoring displayed

General discussion about the different types of air quality monitoring and their effectiveness

- (LL) Asked if BC had ever thought about alternative methods of dust monitoring
- (RB) The community feedback regarding depositional dust gauges is generally negative however this is just one

method of measuring dust. BC are continually looking for better ways to monitor air quality

- (PF) A great deal of research has gone into air quality monitoring in the Hunter Valley
- (RB) The regulators are the key drivers in this area
- (KC) Suggested that BC could be the instigators of new and better systems
- (HR) BC has always responded to requests from property owners for dust monitors to be installed
- (GE) There has been community concerns raised about the amount of coal dust coming from trains passing through Boggabri
- (RB) Coal train dust is an active ongoing discussion but is driven by the regulators, BC is a stakeholder but this is a regulatory issue.
- *Action (PF) Instigate a discussion with EPA with regard to dust coming off coal trains
- *Action (PF) Invite a representative from the EPA to attend BC CCC meeting
- (KC) BC should be more proactive with the monitoring of coal dust in towns
- (PF) The EPA audited the rail corridor recently
- (KC) Where is the nearest PM10 monitor to the rail line? (HR) Merriown (location pointed out on the air quality monitoring map)
- (LL) Are there any other strategies available other than depositional dust gauges? (LL) I would just like to know what is in the black dust that is on surfaces and in water tanks
- (HR) BC did put an HVAS in at the request of a resident
- (DR) The systems in place are regulatory driven, BTM Complex is always looking at alternatives and better ways to do things
- (RC) Does the HVAS analyse what is in the dust? (HR) there is some analysis, (PF) there are advantages and disadvantages in all systems. (PF) Important to use the correct sampling technique to achieve the objective that the analysis set out to achieve.
- (DR) LL & GE have both raised concerns regarding air quality so we will make this a major focus at the next meeting as we don't have any more information today
- (LL) There is an overriding concern regarding the rise of Black Lung, BC employees should also be mindful of the dangers
- (RB) BC is more than happy to share the strategies that are in place for minimising risks
- (HR) Ground Water Monitoring locations map displayed

Graphs displaying long term depth to ground water explained. 12 month rainfall graphs displayed

- (PF) Explanation of community sponsorship process
- (DR) Mitchum Neave was requesting information regarding the sponsorship process, (PF) has spoken to Mitchum
- (DR) Mitchum Neave needs to be made aware of the sponsorship process
- (RG) Expressed his gratitude for the support from BC for the Boggabri Drover's Campfire
- (CC) Also expressed gratitude for BC community support for such events as the Arts & Crafts Festival and the Spring Fair, this has not just been money but also man power and general help

7. General Business

(KC) Whitehaven are proposing to build a Northern rail spur to their Vickery Mine; what impacts will this have on BC's offset properties? Will BC have to sell their offsets to Whitehaven?

- (RB) BC have limited knowledge of this; we have been approached by Whitehaven when they were doing a feasibility study and they requested to view some BC owned land but there has been no further correspondence (CC) Whitehaven have 3 options currently tabled regarding the Vickery rail corridor, no decision has been made as to the preferred option
- (KC) What is BC's position regarding the decommissioning of its rail line and its rehabilitation at the end of the mine's life?
- (PF) Approval of a detailed plan for the future of the rail line is to be completed by 2025. (RB) Any decision on what is to happen to the rail line would involve extensive stakeholder consultation
- (RG) What is the expected life of the mine (RB) current approval to 2033
- (KC) Koala recovery How much of BC's offset country is suitable for koalas?
- (CC) There was a study undertaken by researchers into the koala habitats which showed that there are no koala habitats in Leards Forest and it is a corridor for Pilliga Koalas.
- (HR) Questions of this nature need to be addressed to BC's project ecologist; Alex Cockerill.
- (KC) Other studies show Leard Forest (LF) is koala habitat
- (LL) Koalas here don't have chlamydia as do the ones in the Gunnedah area. (LL) has collected koala scats in LF over a number of years. Everyone needs to consider what is being left behind for the next generation, Idemitsu should be looking at a transition plan away from coal
- (HR) Outlined BC's tree planting program; past, present & future
- (RB) Welcomed the contributions from members and outlined BC's obvious commitment to the future, using the approvals process as a minimum standard, BC is demonstrating a higher standard of action
- * Action (DR) Invite Alex Cockerill to meet with the CCC to answer questions relating to koala habitats
- (KC) Recently attended a conference at UNE in Armidale titled "Restore, Regenerate, Revegetate". Whitehaven were to be the main sponsors but were asked to withdraw their support
- (KC) Impressed upon the importance of retaining current landscapes and suggested that biodiversity offsets do not work and that BC needs to stop clearing LF
- (KC) Admitted that BC's rehabilitation was having good results
- (HR) Explained that the biodiversity offsets did work on the theory of retaining ecosystems
- (KC) Biodiversity offsets retain ecosystems in the wrong areas so they don't work. Has BC done any fencing on offset properties to preserve areas?
- (HR) 10s of km's of fencing have already been constructed so far this year on bio diversity offsets
- (CC) Agriculture is losing out with the offset system as productive farms are being turned into fire hazards and feral pest havens, there are also the social impacts within the community, this issue is not simple, there are a great many flow on effects.
- (HR) BC has upgraded all fire breaks and fire access through all properties. The budget includes feral animal controls which are being implemented. BTM Complex work together on these and other issues. Many of the properties purchase as biodiversity offsets are leased back to the previous owners and are still run as productive farms, the vegetation areas are fenced off.
- (PF) Tree clearing is strictly supervised by 5 ecologists, the process is very restrictive
- (RC) Community feedback on BC's rehab is very positive
- (DR) We can't resolve all these issues today.
- (DR) Distribution of CCC agreement for signing
- *Action (DR) requested feedback from CCC members after next meeting
- (DR) Overview of the Environmental Trust. Currently \$300k in trust for projects around LF. Round 1 February April 2016, round 2 is now open from November 2016 April 2017. Information and applications available on the Narrabri Shire website and from the Boggabri Library. Successful applicants from round 1 were the Boggabri

Public School and the Boggabri Showground Trust.

- (DR) BC is calling for representatives to join the Environmental Trust committee, anyone interested to see (DR) after the meeting.
- * Action CCC members talk to (DR) if they wish to get involved with the Leard Forest Environmental Trust
- (RG) The fire near Boggabri last Sunday made it quite clear that fire breaks are of little or no use on days of extreme weather. Plans need to be put in place for these kind of days
- (LL) What actions were taken during extreme weather / fire?
- (RB) Extreme weather procedure. There are strict limitations around hot work so we reduce activities and manage as per our management plans. Workers are brought up early.
- (RG) there were 2 separate accidents on Rangari Road this morning involving cows being hit by people travelling to and from Boggabri Mine, the owner of the cattle indicated to (RG) that he thought speed was the main contributor. Police will determine if speed was a factor
- (RG) People need to be mindful that livestock may be out on public roads at any time and drive accordingly (RB) If there are any hazards seen on local roads including livestock personnel are asked to advise their supervisor and a notice is issued site wide. There is a reminder issued to all personnel every 3 months for people to report any hazards on public roads.
