# Muswellbrook Coal Continuation means more local jobs

Idemitsu Australia Resources welcomed the decision by Muswellbrook Shire Council to approve an application allowing for continued mining at its Muswellbrook coal mine.

The mine operated by Idemitsu's local subsidiary Muswellbrook Coal Company will see coal mining operations extended for a further three years to 2022 resulting in a further 4.2 million tonnes of additional coal resources being extracted.

Senior Operations Manager, Grant Clouten said that the decision by the

council will provide economic and social benefits to Muswellbrook and surrounding areas.

"The council's decision to support Muswellbrook Coal provides job security and certainty to our 160 full time equivalent employees, local businesses and suppliers with an estimated \$155 million in annual direct and indirect regional output over the life of the project."

"Importantly, this will continue the long and proud association that the mine has had with the Muswellbrook

township. Mining on the site first commenced in 1907, making it one of Australia's oldest active mine sites."

Mr Clouten said that Idemitsu has committed to undertake a comprehensive rehabilitation of the site so that the land has an opportunity to be used productively post-mining.

"We look forward to working with the council and our local community to identify alternative land uses to ensure the site continues to generate jobs and economic prosperity for the township," Mr Clouten said.

# Better data to flow from new groundwater program

MCC commissioned 12 additional groundwater monitoring bores this month, after the completion of drilling which began in July 2015. The bores range in depth from a rather shallow 6m to 396.6m, which is one of the deepest holes drilled by MCC in the project area.

A spokesperson for MCC said the program was extremely well executed, despite experiencing a number of technical and operational difficulties, including the original contractor sadly going into receivership.

Vibrating Wireline Piezometers, installed in four of the bores, will be used to collect groundwater data from a number of coal seams within the overall sequence. Data will be collected as a part of the quarterly water sampling program, improving the veracity of the existing data set currently being collected for future EIS and technical studies.

The school's agriculture students will manage and raise cattle on the property. There are also plans to sow pastures and carry out fencing on the land.

Students, teachers, Muswellbrook Coal representatives and community members recently gathered at the olive grove to celebrate the commencement of the project.


Students performed a traditional Japanese coal miner's dance for representatives of Muswellbrook Coal's parent company, Idemitsu.
